## From Pastor Bruce

## Kvæfjordkake

*Named Norway's National Cake in 2002*

**“The World's Best Cake”**



### Ingredients

#### *Base*

1 stick unsalted butter	1/2 cup sugar
4 egg yolks	3 TB milk
2/3 cup flour	1 tsp vanilla extract
1 tsp baking powder	

#### *Meringue*

4 egg whites	1 cup sugar
--------------	-------------

#### *Filling*

1 1/4 cup heavy cream	2 TB sugar
2 cups vanilla custard	

#### *Topping*

1/2 cup sliced almonds	10-12 sliced strawberries
------------------------	---------------------------

### Directions

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- Line a 13 X 9 pan with parchment paper
- In large bowl, cream butter and sugar until fluffy

## Recipe of the Month

- Mix in egg yolks, one at a time
- Add milk and vanilla extract.
- Sift together flour and baking powder and fold into batter.
- Pour into prepared pan.
- Beat egg whites with sugar until stiff peaks form.
- Pour meringue over cake and sprinkle with almonds.
- Bake on low rack in oven for 15-20 minutes, until meringue is firm and golden in color.
- Cool cake thoroughly on rack. When cooled, cut in half.
- Mix cream and sugar until firm and fold in vanilla custard.
- Slice strawberries and sprinkle with sugar.
- Spread the filling on one half and arrange strawberries on filling. Top with the other half of the cake.
- Refrigerate for at least 4 hours.

## Jeremy's Egg



Jeremy was born with severe mental and physical disabilities and wasn't expected to live very long. At age 12 Jeremy exasperated his Sunday School teacher. She met with the pastor after church one Sunday and explained how distracting he was for the other 15 children in her class. She suggested he should not come to Sunday School anymore. He didn't fit with younger children and couldn't keep up with those his own age.

The pastor reminded her that Jeremy and his parents, maybe more than any other members, needed hers and the congregation's love and support. He counselled her to have patience.

The teacher worked hard to ignore his outbursts and blank stares. She talked to the other children about not laughing at Jeremy, but hard as she tried, he didn't seem to really know what was going on.

Spring came and on Palm Sunday the teacher told the children the story of Jesus' death and resurrection. To emphasize the idea of a new life in Christ, she gave each of them a hollow plastic egg. She told the children to bring it back on Easter with something inside that reminded them of new life. Jeremy stared at her blankly. She thought about explaining the assignment to his parents, but didn't see them after church.

The next Sunday all of the children put their eggs in a basket. One by one, she opened the eggs and found butterflies, tiny chicks, and flowers. She asked each child to explain what was in their egg. She praised each one, and the children beamed with pride.

Then the teacher opened an egg and found it empty. She knew it must be Jeremy's. He hadn't understood, and she felt guilty for not calling his parents to explain. The children giggled and pointed at Jeremy. Rather than embarrass him any more, she picked up another egg.

"Aren't you going to talk about my egg?" asked Jeremy in a loud voice.

"But its empty, Jeremy," said the teacher gently.

"So was Jesus' tomb!" was Jeremy's excited reply.

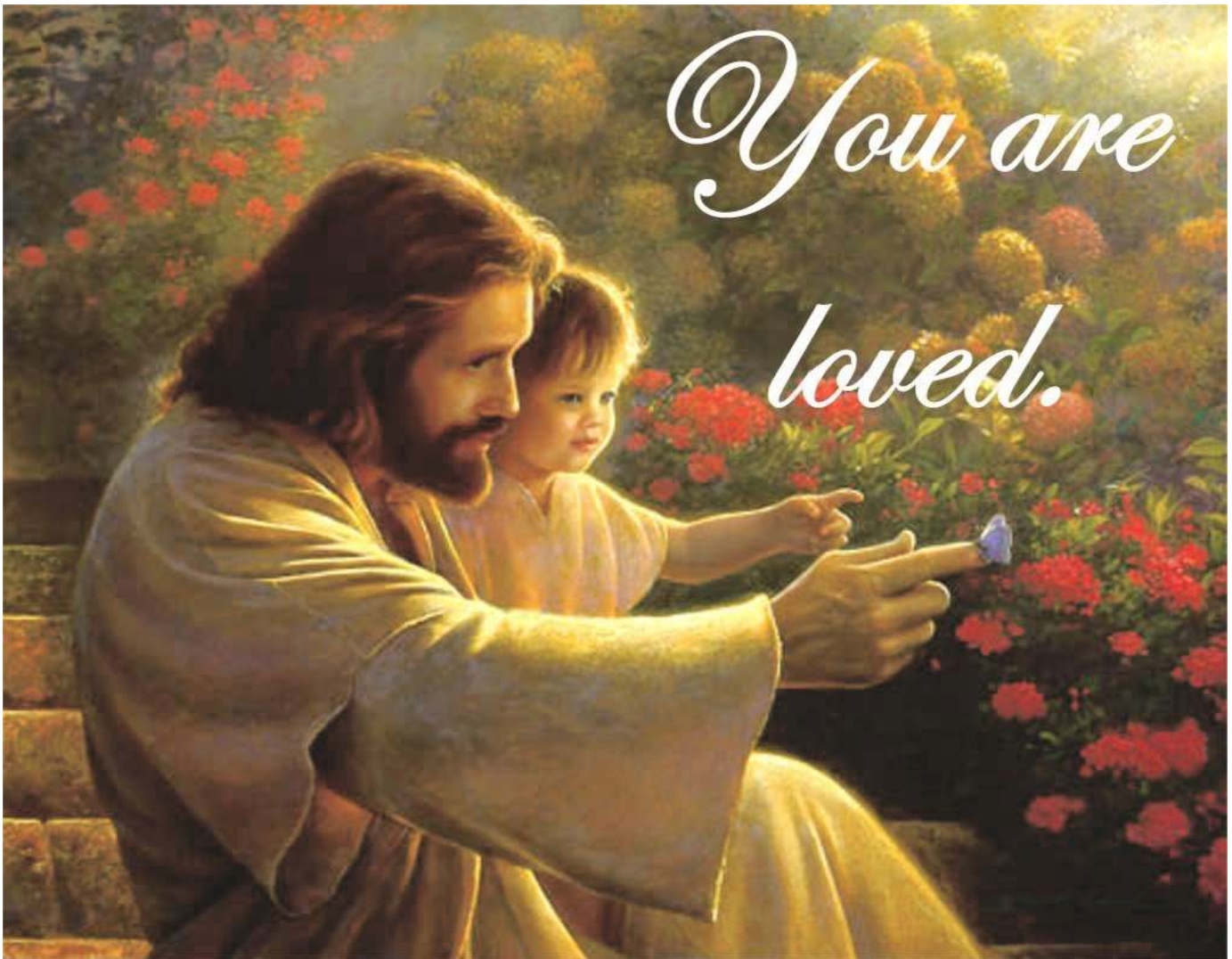
"Do you know what the empty tomb meant?" the teacher asked carefully.

"Sure!" said Jeremy, "Jesus got killed, but his Father didn't let him stay dead and because of that we don't have to die, either. The tomb was empty, just like my egg!"

The children were suddenly silent. After class, the teacher cried as she thought about how quickly she had given up on Jeremy, when he understood the Easter story better than any one else.

Before summer ended, Jeremy died. Those who attended his funeral were puzzled by the 15 colorful plastic eggs nestled in the flowers on his casket – all of them open, all of them empty.

### **“Buffalo River Stages Revolt”**

#### **Shoots up Miniature Geyser through Ice, High Water Overflows**

Pressure of water under ice in the Buffalo River Monday caused a miniature geyser near the J. H. Anstett farm, four miles north of Watts Siding. With a loud roar the water shot into the air 10 feet, continued for about 20 minutes, then died down. Water continued to flow over the ice for several hours, however.

The Buffalo has been on a rampage during the last few days, overflowing its banks and flooding many acres of land in some areas. The ice-choked stream damaged a bridge near the Anstett farm, water flowing over the span floor. During the last 24 hours, however, the river has receded somewhat.
